



TREE MOSS SCARF

This scarf is knitted as a grid, which creates a nice pattern of alternating mohair and chenille, and enables it to drape easily. Once knitted the combination of the jewel-green mohair and the light green chenille put me in mind of something that was organically created – or grown; hence the scarf's name.

Sizes: One size fits all (it really does!)

Yarn:

1 skein Colinette Colourway Chenille 114 Olive
(Two skeins if you are making a long scarf)
1 skein Colinette Mohair Yarn in Renaissance

Needles:

1 pair of U.S.size 10 needles
1 crochet hook for fringe

Tension:

Throw caution to the wind you don't need it with this pattern.

With Yarn A cast on 25 stitches.

Knit two rows.

Add Mohair.

Rows 1 thru 6 below form Grid Pattern:

Row 1) *Sl (you are slipping the chenille) knit 3 (of mohair)* – repeat * to end of row.

Row 2) *S1, move working yarn (Mohair) to knit side, Knit 3* – repeat * to end of row.

Rows 3 and 4) Repeat rows 1 and 2

Rows 5 and 6) With Chenille K one row

Repeat grid pattern until scarf measures desired length.

Fringe:

Cut 12 inch sections of chenille yarn and attach them on edges with crochet hook.
